It consists of 23 contemporary New Zealand artists, some of whom grew up in Howick and Pakuranga and work at the Manukau Institute of Technology.

Their works come in the form of film, photography, print, sculpture, collage and ceramics.

Miss Fowler says the works challenge the genre of traditional portraiture and give a different, broad perspective on what portraiture can be. She approached various artists to contribute to

the exhibition after visiting the National Portrait Gallery in Wellington.

She spent three years researching what portraiture means to contemporary artists
