ARTIST John Reynolds' first major public gallery exhibition can be seen now at the Fisher

Gallery in Pakuranga. A visitor to Madrid for the Distance Looks Our Way exhibition which ran alongside Expo, Reynolds' response to the region's culture has influenced this current showing, titled Eureka School, a large seven-panel work and a number of relating smaller pieces which reflect his encounters with Moorish-Islamic art forms - or, as he puts it. "this work is a contemplation of the process of revelation". The collection runs until May 23, and offers the chance to study the progress of one of this year's QEII Arts Council Fellows.

Also at the galleries: Fatu Feu'u's Ancestral Spirits — woodcuts, collage and drawings linking ancient Polynesian spiritual traditions to modern times, at the Lane Gallery in O'Connell St, until May 9; and inveterate traveller Peter O'Hagan's impressions of the tiny Portuguese territory of Macau (like Hong Kong, the Chinese take over in 1997), at Remuera's John Leech Gallery from May 1-May 20.

Music lovers, feast on this week's events. The Auckland Philharmonia continues its inter-

national series at the Aotea Centre's ASB Theatre, with conductor Jiri Starek of Prague, and violin soloist Mark Lubotsky of St Petersburg joining the orchestra for Rossin's William Tell Overture, Dvorak's Symphony No 6, and Britten's Violin Concerto. You can also hear Lubotsky tonight at 8pm at Auckland University's School of Music.

Edwin Carr conducts St Matthew's Chamber Orchestra, featuring APO harpist Rebecca Harris, at the cathedral today at 2.30pm, with a selection from Handel, Debussy, Haydn, Mozart and the premiere of Carr's very own Sinfonietta. Tomorrow, eatch the Rothmans Foundation lunchtime season, free at the Pioneer Womens Hall in High St every Monday at 1pm until the end of June; or, on the Shore, Songs From the Shows, at Takapuna's Pumphouse from 12.10pm.

The New Zealand Symphony Orchestra is on the move, with chief conductor Dr Franz-Paul Decker and celebrated Irish mezzo-soprano Bernadette Greevy. Hamilton audiences will be treated to a programme including Strauss' Macbeth and Berlioz's Death of Cleopatra on Thursday at the Founders Theatre: there's an early evening show at Auckland's Aotea Centre on Friday, with pianist Michael Houstoun: followed by an all-Mahler programme the following evening, again at the Aotea, before heading off for Wellington on May 8.

For an international flavour, visit the Aotea Centre over the next couple of days, where a programme of live shows and arts and crafts from sources as diverse as Cherokee, Welsh and Tamil have been organised under the grand title Traditional Arts and Culture '93. The festival opens today at 2pm, with a guest appearance by '60s flower child folkie Julie Felix.
